Languages Spoken at Behavioral Health Agencies Serving Children and Youth in Washington State

Report from the

2020 Behavioral Health Provider Survey

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The Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery (DBHR) of the Washington State Health Care Authority has contracted with the Social and Economic Sciences Research Center (SESRC) to conduct the 2020 Behavioral Health Provider Survey. The survey aims to assess agency characteristics, quality improvement efforts, and behavioral health (BH) clinical staff demographics.

The target population for the survey consists of Department of Health certified, communitybased mental health (MH) and substance use disorder (SUD) treatment agencies providing publicly funded services in Washington state.

The online survey was conducted from April through September 2020. Agency directors or administrators received a paper introduction letter by first-class mail announcing the project and providing information on how to access the online survey. Non-respondents received email reminders. Non-respondents were also contacted once by telephone to encourage them to complete the survey and to also confirm that the agency was still in operation.

Originally, the sample included 723 agencies since each location is a unit of analysis. However, agencies were given the option to consolidate sites into one survey. The adjusted population size is 578 agencies. Responses were received from 352 agencies resulting in a response rate of 60.9%.

Respondents were asked "How many of your behavioral health clinical staff are bilingual or multilingual and are able to provide BH services in a non-English language?"

That question was followed up with "How many of your behavioral health clinical staff speak a language other than English?" The survey listed 46 different languages plus an 'Other' category.

Overall, 213 agencies indicated they provide BH services to children and youth represents 60.5% of the agencies responding to the survey (213/352). *These 213 agencies are the focus of this report.*



Languages Spoken by BH Clinical Staff

The 213 children and youth serving BH agencies that responded to our survey reported having 8,671 total BH staff and 6,326 BH clinical staff. Of the 6,326 BH clinical staff, 665, or approximately 10.5%, were reported to be bilingual or multi-lingual.

- Spanish is by far the most common language spoken other than English with 390 BH clinical staff.
- Chinese is spoken by 60 out of 665 bilingual BH staff
- Vietnamese (3.6%), Tagalog (2.6%), Japanese (2.4%), Korean (2.1%), German (2.0%), Thai (1.7%), Laotian (1.7%), French (1.7%), Arabic (1.5%), American Sign Language (1.2%), and Russian (1.2%) are the next most common languages spoken.

Agencies with Bilingual/Multi-lingual Capabilities

Out of the 213 agencies that serve youth or children, 134 indicated they have at least one staff member who is bilingual or multi-lingual and able to provide BH services in a non-English language (62.9%).
