ACLU of Washington Comments



- Public health approaches for substance use disorders will have better outcomes than punitive ones
- Current problems in Washington are happening all over the country and are being driven by factors such as the pandemic, workforce issues, and lack of services
 - States with highest percentage increase in drug overdose between March 2021 to March 2022 – Alaska (49.7%), Idaho (38.57%), South Dakota (29.87%), New Hampshire (26.39%), Washington (26.22%)

- Major changes to drug laws do happen and can have beneficial outcomes – Needle Exchange Programs, Death with Dignity, Marijuana Legalization (Initiative 502 – not perfect, but sky hasn't fallen)
- Be mindful that community advocates have been working on the question of new approaches to drug possession for years — I-1715 (2020), HB 1499 — Pathways to Recovery Act (2021), I-1922. It's where SURSAC originated.

Policy Considerations:

- Possession of controlled substances-legend drugs paraphernalia - Decriminalization, Depenalization, Diversion
- Civil infraction or a referral process
- Thresholds or not fixed amounts, rulemaking process, case law standard
- State preemption
- Past convictions

- Until the state fully invests in public health alternatives, including low-barrier case-management, alternatives to jails and ERs, robust physical and behavioral services, housing, long term recovery supports, etc., we won't see success regardless of the legal status of drug possession.
- Safe Supply options should be included as a recommendation from SURSAC as part of the state's response.
