Housing and recovery through peer services (HARPS)





Research shows a connection between inpatient treatment and homelessness

Within one year of discharge from a psychiatric hospital nearly 30% of individuals become homeless

Within one year of discharge from an inpatient SUD Treatment facility nearly 50% of individuals become homeless

Homelessness exacerbates mental health symptoms and substance use



What does the HARPS program do?

Subsidies to get housing (security deposits, rent, background screenings.)

Supportive Housing Services, including peer support, to maintain housing.

Landlord outreach.

Individual housing & tenancy sustaining Services.

Housing related collaborative activities.



HARPS Eligibility Requirements

Individuals who experience behavioral health disorders (either a mental health disorder, substance use disorder, or both) and who demonstrate a medical necessity for inpatient behavioral health services or

Individuals who are discharging from an inpatient behavioral health setting homeless or

Individuals who at risk of entering an inpatient behavioral health facility

Homelessness includes a broad definition of unstably housed (includes couch surfing)

HARPS Objective:

Prevents homelessness for individuals leaving inpatient treatment settings
