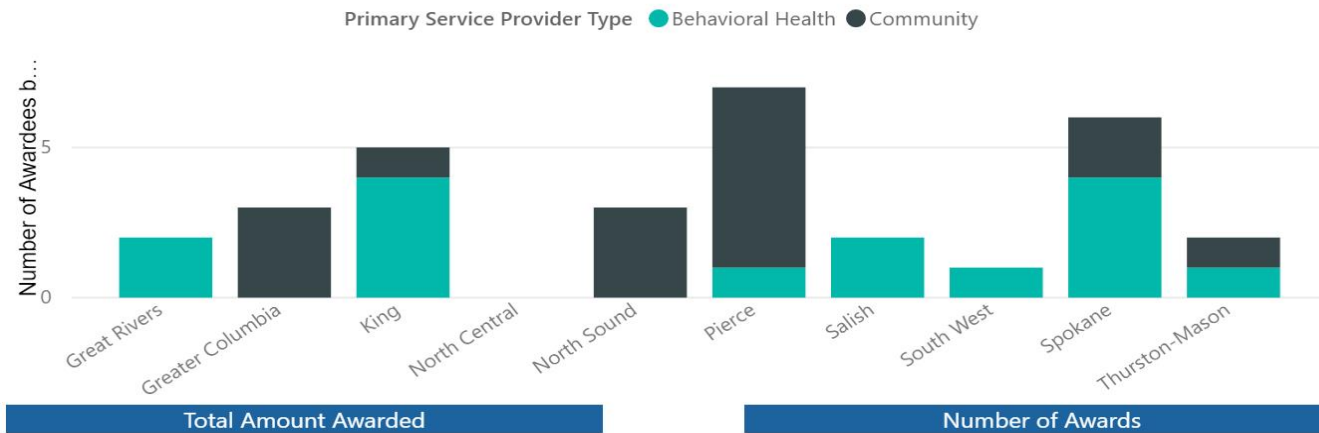

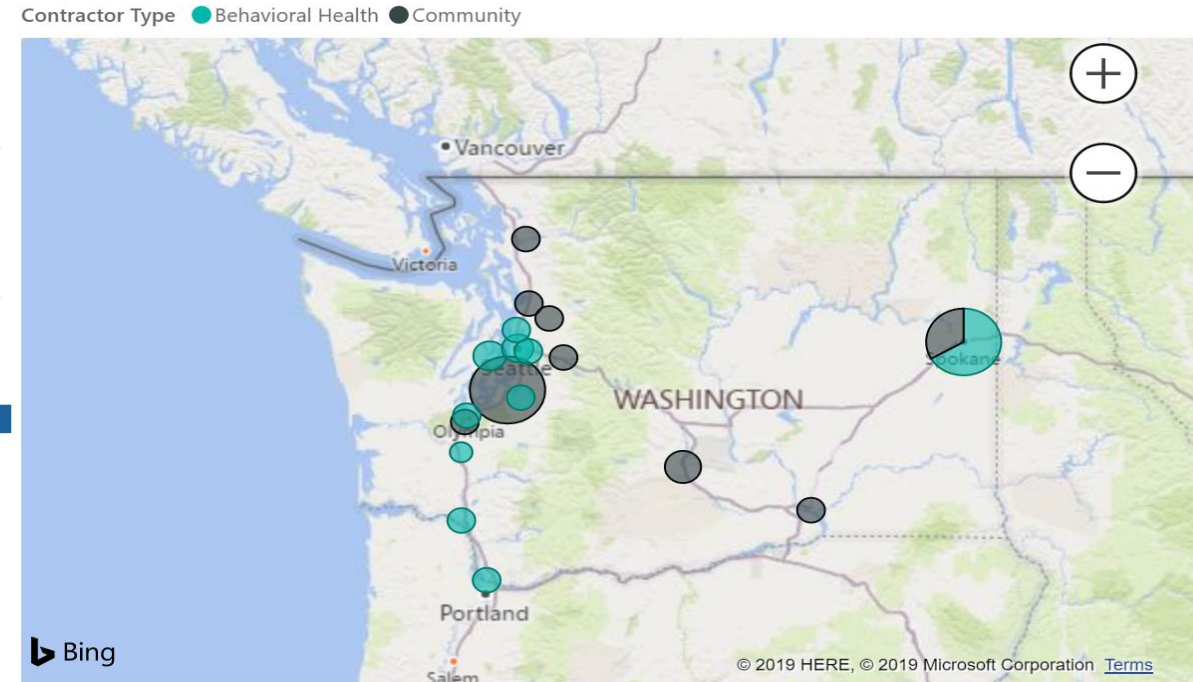
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- ▶ HCA is committed to implementing Trauma Informed Approach (TIA) in the State of Washington

- ▶ Each Awardee was required to partner with another agency to share their expertise and spread the reach of TIA.
  - ▶ These Partnerships were encouraged to be between a Behavioral Health Provider and a Community Service Provider in any combination they preferred.
  - ▶ Many awardees partnered with more than one agency.

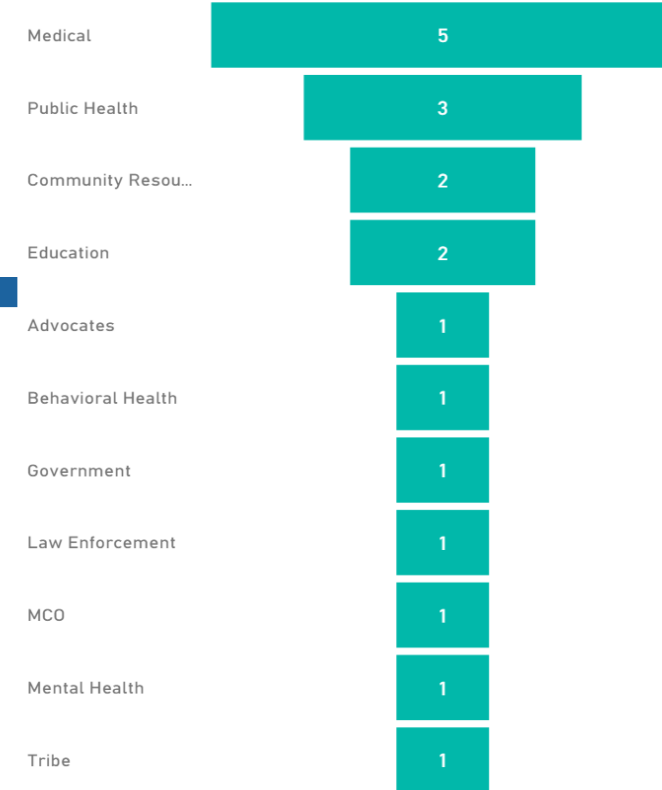
## How Behavioral Health Grantees Partnered



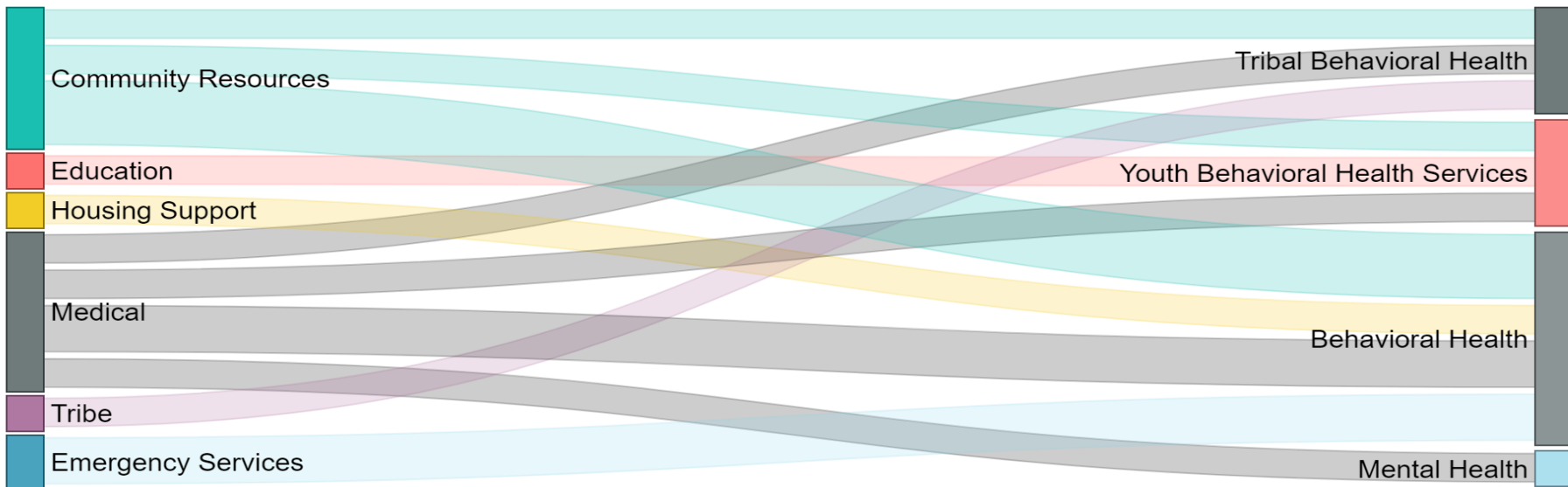
## Percentage with Multiple Partners

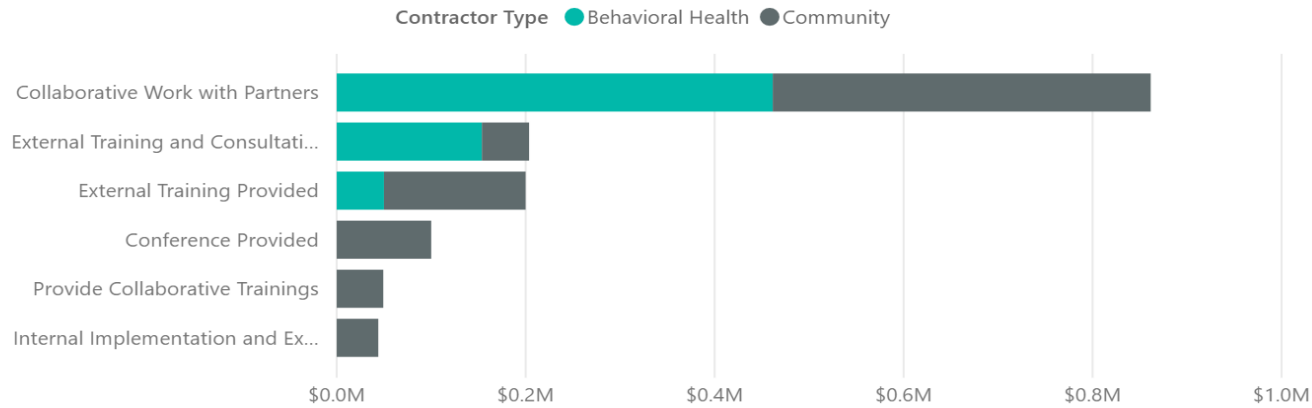
## Multiple Partner Breakdown



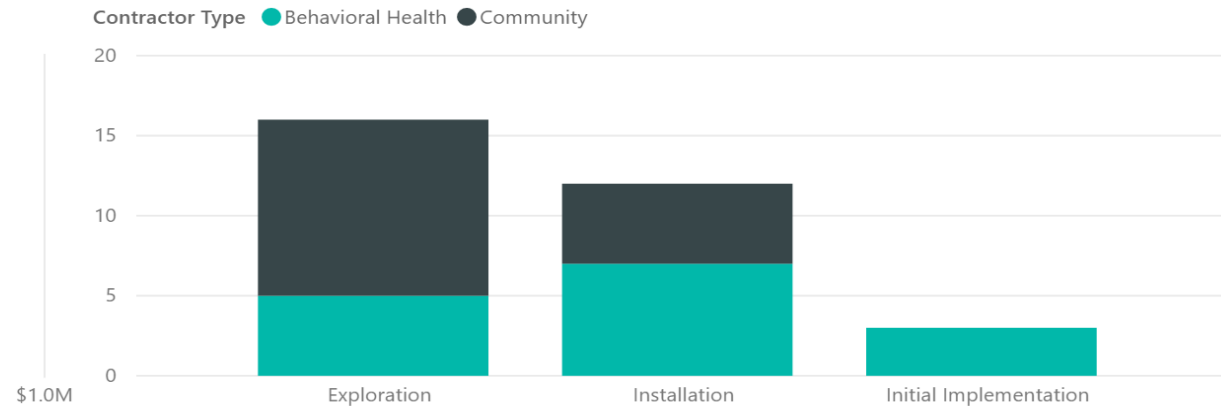

## Where Awardees are at the Start of Work

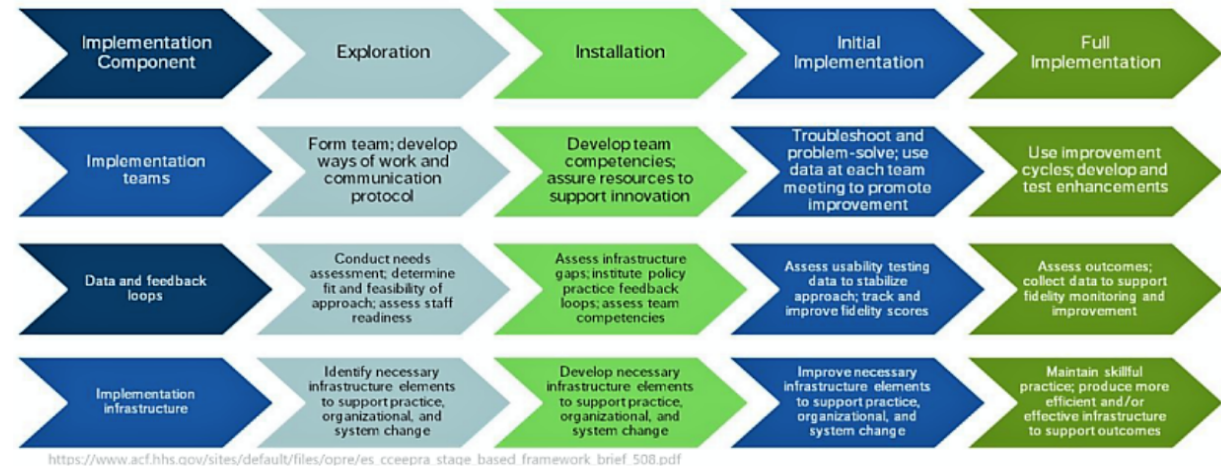

Conference Provided - when the lead agency is putting on a conference for multiple partners to train them and introduce TIA.

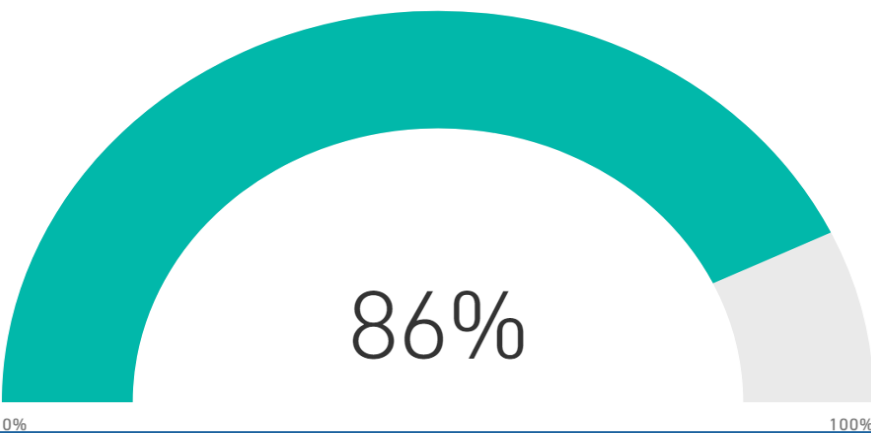
