WASHINGTON STATE DRUG LAWS: RACIAL DISPARITY & DISPROPORTIONATE IMPACTS

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IN THE BEGINNING

MARCH 1965, President Johnson Produced the Law enforcement assistance act, which authorized the federal government to take a direct role in militarizing local police.

In 1968, Johnson also produced **Safe Streets**, where he invested \$400 million in the war on crime and created law enforcement assistance administration to oversee the funding priorities:

- 1. TO SUPERVISE AND SURVEIL LOW-INCOME URBAN COMMUNITIES
- 2. To Enforce a prohibition on Narcotics in those communities

ALTHOUGH THOSE COMMUNITIES AREN'T THE ONLY PLACES THAT CRIME AND DRUGS COULD BE FOUND, LOW-INCOME URBAN COMMUNITIES WERE TARGETED

WHY THE WAR ON DRUG USERS?

"You want to know what this was really all about? Nixon had two enemies: the antiwar Left, and black people. We knew we couldn't make it illegal to be either against the war or black. But by getting the public to associate the hippies with marijuana and blacks with heroin, and then criminalizing both heavily, we could disrupt those communities. Did we know we were lying about the drugs? Of course we did."

BIAS BOTH IMPLICIT AND EXPLICIT CONTRIBUTE TO DISPARITY

- BIAS EMBEDDED WITHIN THE LEGAL SYSTEM FUELS
 THE MYTH ABOUT THE BEHAVIOR OF BLACK AND
 BROWN FOLKS STEMS FROM INNATE PERSONAL
 CHARACTERISTICS RATHER THAN
 EXTERNAL/CONTEXTUAL FACTORS, AND THUS THEY
 ARE SEEN AS MORE CULPABLE BY SYSTEMS
- THE "UNEXPLAINED" DISPARITY ANALYSIS BY WSIPP (KNOTH 2021) DEMONSTRATES THIS BIAS, BY IGNORING THE GREATER CONTEXT OF THE ENFORCEMENT OF SIMPLE POSSESSION STATUTE IN THE CONTEXT OF THE DRUG WAR.



"RACISM IS THE ROOT OF THE DRUG WAR TREE"

RACIAL BIAS IS THE ONLY POSSIBLE EXPLANATION FOR RACIAL DIFFERENCES IN SENTENCING. RESEARCHERS HAVE ALSO RAISED THE POSSIBILITY OF DIFFERENTIAL ACCESS TO RESOURCES, SUCH AS LEGAL AND PSYCHIATRIC RESOURCES. THE AVAILABILITY TO ARRANGE AND PAY FOR ALTERNATIVE SCHOOLS CONTRIBUTES TO DIFFERENTIAL SENTENCING PRACTICES.

RACIAL DISPARITIES IN PUNISHMENT ALSO EXTEND TO SCHOOL DISCIPLINE. EVIDENCE SUGGESTS THAT STEREOTYPES ABOUT YOUNG BLACK MALES HELD BY TEACHERS AND ADMINISTRATORS (AND POSSIBLY INTERNALIZED BY STUDENTS THEMSELVES) CONTRIBUTE TO DISPARITIES IN DISCIPLINE (FERGUSON, 2000; Horner et al., 2010).

"WARRANTED DISPARITY" RELATED TO DRUG CHARGES IS SYSTEMIC RACISM AND VIOLENCE

- THE IMPLICATION THAT CRIMINAL HISTORY SCORES ARE RACE-NEUTRAL IS FALSE.
- DISPROPORTIONATE ENFORCEMENT AND IMPACT OF DRUG LAWS SINCE THE 1970s HAVE RESULTED IN HIGHER OFFENDER SCORES FOR BLACK AND BROWN PEOPLE.
- DISPARITIES EXIST THROUGHOUT THE SYSTEM AND HAVE BEEN SUSTAINED/ REINFORCED THROUGH POLICY DECISIONS (MUCH LIKE THE PROCESS AND POLICY DECISIONS BEING MADE BY THE SURSAC OR THE BLAKE DECISION).
- CRIMINAL LEGAL SYSTEM INVOLVEMENT IS A SOCIAL DETERMINANT
 OF HEALTH THAT IS COMPOUNDED BY RACISM THAT DEEPENS
 HEALTH DISPARITIES, CONFOUNDS AN INDIVIDUALS' ACCESS TO
 HOUSING, EDUCATION, AND MEANINGFUL CONNECTION TO
 COMMUNITY AND RESOURCES.




DISPROPORTIONALITY IS A WASHINGTON STATE PROBLEM, TOO.

Washington State has a small African-American population (approx. 3%), yet its prison population aligns with national trends with Black People representing over 25 percent of those incarcerated, 11 times their percentage of the population.

African Americans constitute about 3 percent of the state population; however, 51 percent of those incarcerated for drug offenses are African American. Only four other states have a higher rate than Washington State of incarcerating African-American men.

SIMPLE POSSESSION STATUTE AND ASSOCIATED CHARGES HAVE CAUSED GREAT HARM.

- THE "WAR ON DRUGS" IS NOT CATCHING THE DRUG KINGPINS IT'S INTENDED TO.
- PRISONS ARE FILLED WITH MANY PEOPLE WITH BEHAVIORAL HEALTH ISSUES WHO WERE CONVICTED OF NONVIOLENT LOW-LEVEL OFFENCES.
- Facing Cutbacks, Washington State offers people alternatives to incarceration with treatment as an option, but the policies and practices of the state are not benefitting disenfranchised groups.
- Through the "War on Drugs," employment, housing, and educational discrimination have been legalized with an already marginalized group suffering the consequences.
- THE WAR ON DRUGS HAS INFLUENCED THE FACE OF THE PRISON POPULATION AND IS TURNING INTO A LEGALIZED FORMED OF DISCRIMINATION ACROSS THE COUNTRY.

CRIMINAL LEGAL SYSTEM INVOLVEMENT IS A SOCIAL DETERMINANT OF HEALTH THAT IS COMPOUNDED BY RACISM AND STIGMA.

- DEEPENS HEALTH DISPARITIES
- CONFOUNDS AN INDIVIDUAL'S ACCESS TO HOUSING, EDUCATION, AND MEANINGFUL CONNECTION TO COMMUNITY AND RESOURCES
- Criminalization is the antithesis and enemy of Recovery



END CRIMINAL PENALTIES FOR SIMPLE POSSESSION AND IMPLEMENT LEAD STATEWIDE

INVESTMENT IN CARE SYSTEMS THAT WORK, INCLUDING RELATIONSHIP-BASED CASE MANAGEMENT:

- Increases Health Equity
- IMPROVES HEALTH OUTCOMES
- Connects people back to community



WE HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO DO BETTER:

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS MUST:

- Move away from the prohibition-based system
- Stabilize and provide access to appropriate and dignified housing, Legal Sources of Income, and services without discrimination
- Expand geographic reach of harm reduction services
- Invest in Peer Navigators and Peer Workers:
 NOT JUST THOSE WITH CERTIFICATION, BUT ALL PEOPLE WITH LIVED EXPERIENCE
- Increase Equity and Restore people and Communities disproportionately impacted by the War on drugs
