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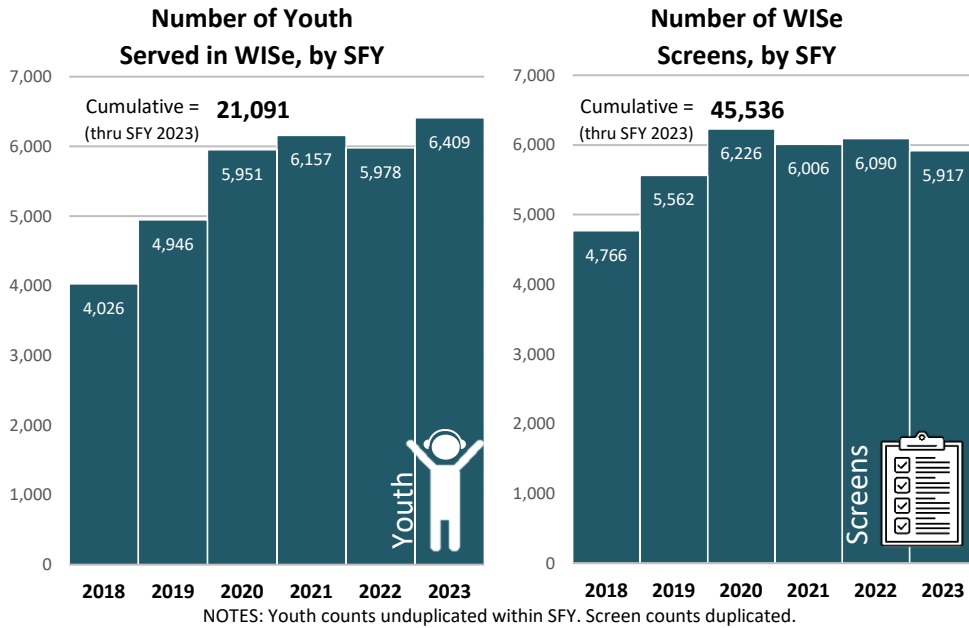
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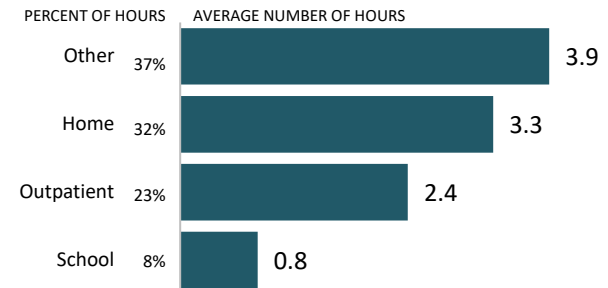

## Average Monthly WISE Service Hours, SFY 2023

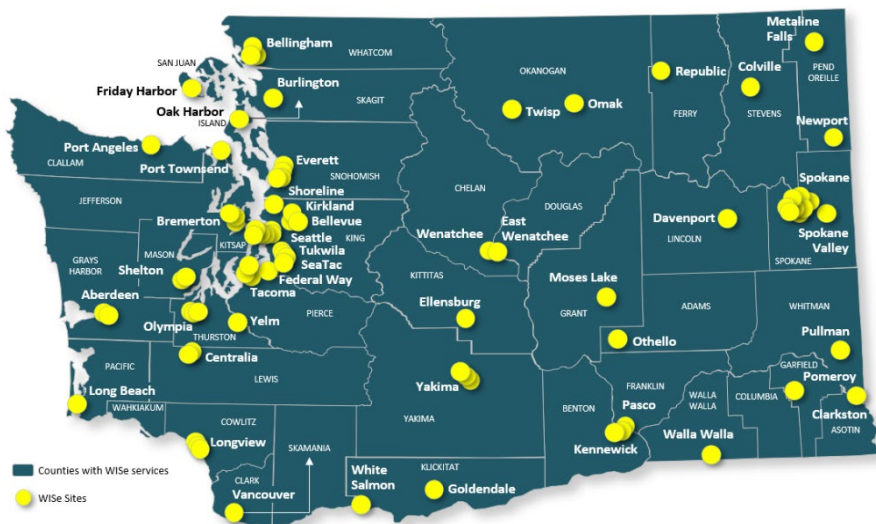


## Service Hours by Location, SFY 2023

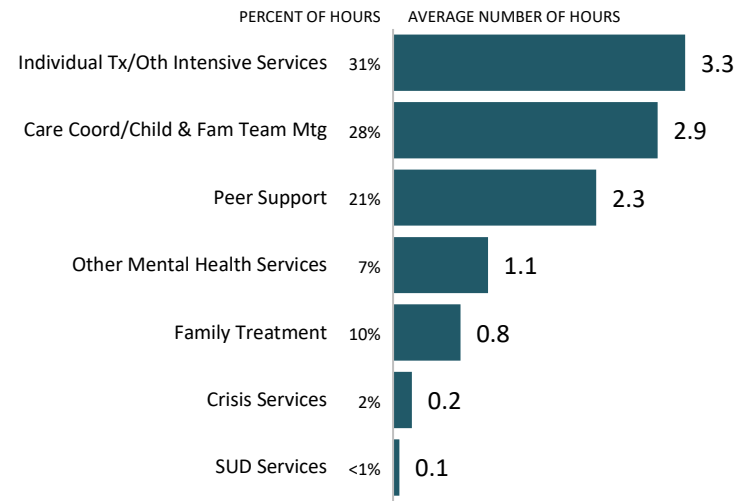


## WISE Service Providers as of March 2024

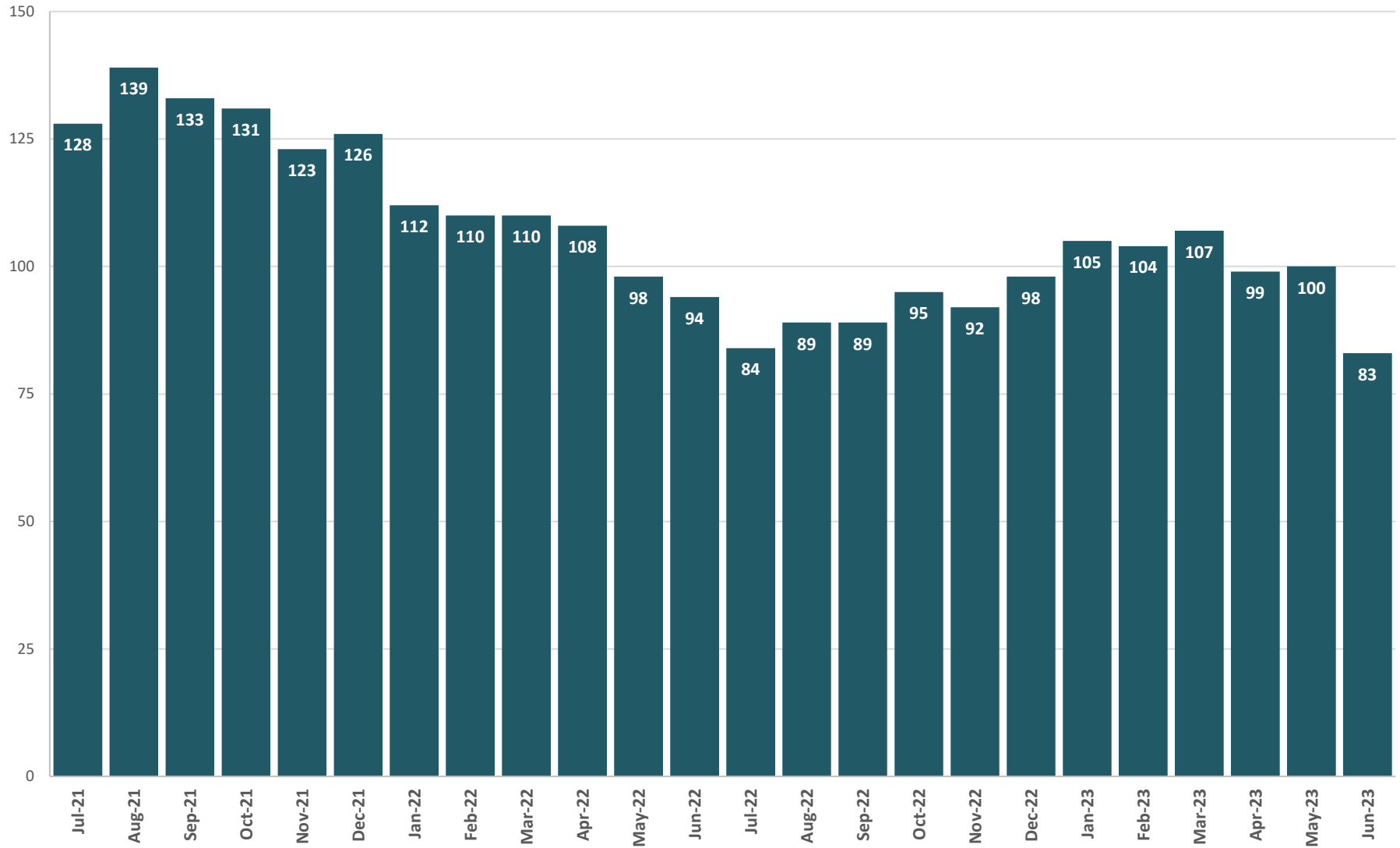

Most Recent 24 Months of Data

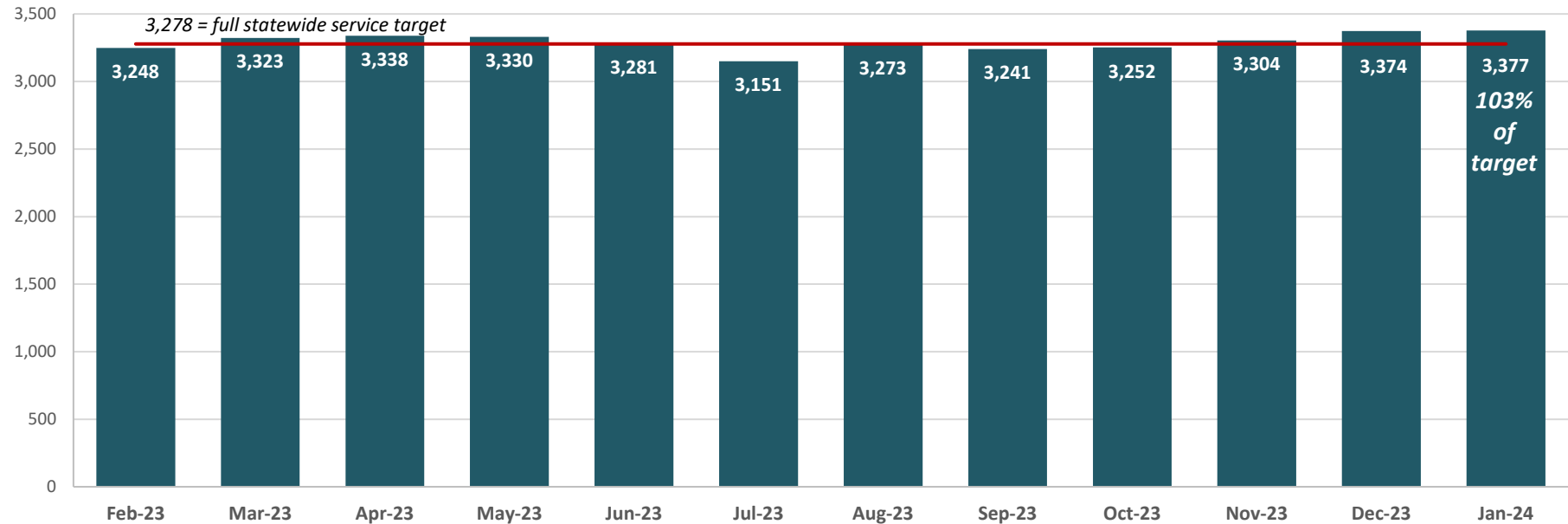
