California's PARIS Input File

Every quarter, the State of California contributes millions of beneficiary records to the PARIS-Interstate Match. All of these individuals are enrolled in the State's Medicaid Program. This is reflected by a "Y" in the Medicaid Program Indicator field on the PARIS Input File.

In an effort to assist other states in determining residency for recipients who are matched on PARIS, the State of California has made changes to the data elements in their file. Previously, California was using the date the input file was created in the (MA) start date field. While California would have liked to insert the first day of the individual's current certification period into that field, the changes required to do that in their legacy enrollment database proved too extensive. However, to remove potentially misleading information from their file, California's starting date field will now be blank. This change was in place in time for the August 10, 2018 match.

All States are encouraged to provide the most accurate information as possible in their input files. For example, do not include placeholder telephone contact numbers, such as (123) 456-7890, if you do not want to be contacted by phone. In this scenario, a state could supply reliable fax and email contacts while leaving the telephone field blank.

Other states rely on the accuracy of all fields, including the program eligibility start/end dates, to administer their public assistance programs. The Board appreciates California improving the veracity of their PARIS input data for the benefit of all other states.

Next PARIS quarterly submission deadline is: Friday, November 9, 2018 PARIS is operated under the auspices of the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS)

More Than Just Pensions - Many Types of Veteran Benefits

When researching possible military related benefits that you or a family member may be eligible for, the vast information on <u>www.VA.gov</u> can be very overwhelming. However, if you review the website material, you'll be surprised to find that most of the info you really need is conveniently located under the "benefits" tab.

According to the latest VA census, most people do not know that spouses and children of some veterans are eligible for healthcare benefits, however, the veteran must be 100 percent disabled from his or her time in service, or must have died in the line of duty.

The government also offers a pension for spouses of some veterans. In this case, the veteran must have served during the periods designated as "war-time service".

When it comes to children of veterans, some are eligible for financial help for their education. To qualify for these benefits, the veteran must be permanently disabled from his or her time in the service or must have died in the line of duty. Another benefit for veterans is the VA Home Loan program. The government will help veterans get a low interest home loan or even assist them if they are behind on payments.

There are also specific home loan programs for Native Americans who have served and for disabled veterans. For details on all the VA's Home Loan programs, <u>https://www.benefits.va.gov/homeloans/</u>.

Finally, yet so importantly, there are several programs for homeless veterans.

Don't forget to include program eligibility dates.

So, take a moment to go through your state's information on the PARIS website for accuracy and provide any changes or updates.
