

HCA Updates





Certified Public Expenditures (CPEs)

- For Tribes that serve non-AI/AN clients for SUD services
 - 16 Tribes
 - The CPE process launched in July
 - For Q3/Q4 2018 attestations (the first round) -- 11 of 16 have submitted the CPE attestation
 - For Q1/Q2 2019 attestations (the current process) 6 of 16 have submitted the CPE attestation
- Mike plans on being in compliance before CY2019 ends
 - This means HCA would have sanctions set to do their thing beginning on or about 02/15/2020

Behavioral Health Updates





Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD)

- Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill (SSB) 5380 (Opioid Response Bill) added a new section: RCW 71.24.589.
- 5 million dollars in State and Federal Appropriations for the 2019-2021 Biennium to support Statewide expansion of LEAD programs.
- A minimum of two jurisdictions will be awarded funding and technical assistance and training by the LEAD National Support Bureau.
- Eligible Applicants include Cities, Counties, and Tribes.
- Anticipated release date of October 15th with applications due November 1st. Services to begin January 1st 2020.



LEAD Core Principles

- Community Based Diversion Program that leverages law enforcement participation to connect individuals to a structured treatment program in a patient-centered, holistic model of care.
- Core Principles of LEAD:
 - ► Intensive Case Management
 - Wrap-around services
 - ► Harm Reduction Framework
 - ► Housing 1st model
 - ► Abstinence is not required



Goals of LEAD



I. REORIENT

government's response to safety, disorder, and health-related problems



4. UNDO

racial disparities at the front end of the criminal justice system



2. IMPROVE

public safety and public health through research based, health-oriented and harm reduction interventions



5. SUSTAIN

funding for alternative interventions by capturing and reinvesting justice systems savings



3.REDUCE

the number of people entering the criminal justice system for low level offenses related to drug use, mental health, sex work, and extreme poverty



6. STRENGTHEN

the relationship between law enforcement and the community

Background on the PG Task Force

- ► WA State Gambling Commission (WSGC) worked with House and Senate legislators to sponsor bills to create the PG Joint Legislative Task Force
- One of the bills came close to passing, but ultimately did not pass
- However... a \$100K Proviso for WSGC was included in the state appropriations budget
- WSGC and DBHR/HCA staff coordinating on timeline and next steps
- WSGC staff are working on legislative appointments to Task Force




Current activity:

- Establishing DBHR/HCA as lead agency:
 - ► Transfer Proviso funding from WSGC to DBHR/HCA using IAA
 - ► Agreement: WSGC & DBHR/HCA designating HCA as lead agency
- Request for Proposal (RFP) for Facilitator
- ○Inviting Tribal representatives (DTL letters) By 10/15
- ○Inviting rest of members By 11/1
- Scheduling first Task Force meeting (Dec 2019/Jan 2020)



Timeline – Problem Gambling Task Force





PG Task Force -- Steps

- ▶ Review findings of gambling commission's problem gambling study and report (2018-2019)
- Review existing prevention, treatment, recovery, training, and outreach services in WA State (provided by public, private, and non-profit entities)
- Review existing programs, services, and treatment in other states and federal government
- ► Any additional actions needed by State/regulatory agencies? Q for Task Force—Include new and emerging topics such as 'internet & technology-based addiction?'



Final Report to Legislature – Due 11/2021

Make recommendations to the legislature regarding:

- Next steps to initiate a Prevalence study (measuring adult participation & problem gambling in WA State)
- ➤ If the State should expand state funding for prevention, tx and recovery services for PG
- >Steps to improve current licensing and certification of PG providers to meet the current and projected future demand for services
- ➤ Identify additional pg-related areas for actions needed to ensure the STATE and/or regulatory agencies are doing best to reduce # of people impacted by problem gambling
- Q for Task Force: Should State expand definition to include new and emerging topics such as 'internet & technology-based addiction' to problem gambling RCW & WAC?
