Strong Start Program Overview

Marilyn Dold and Karin Neidt (Washington Department of Health) gave a presentation on the Strong Start Program. Strong Start is a universal developmental screening system for Infant-Age 5.

- 1. Program background: Strong Start was authorized by the 2019 legislature.
 - a. Built as a data system using Medicaid Match funding
 - b. Implementation was delayed due to COVID-19 but currently operates and serves children from Infant-age 5.
- 2. While Strong Start focuses specifically on developmental screening records, there are important connections with mental health:
 - a. Perinatal mental health risk factors can affect child development
 - b. Children with developmental delays may experience accompanying mental health issues
 - c. Trauma can impact developmental outcomes, making screening crucial for differential diagnosis
- 3. Key Features of Strong Start system
 - a. Serves as a central repository for developmental screening records



- b. Provides access to licensed healthcare providers and parents/legal guardians
- c. Recently expanded to include Early Care and Education Providers
- d. Available in both English and Spanish
- e. Uses Secure Access Washington (SAW) for privacy protection
- f. Parental Permissions control available
- 4. Screening Tools Available
 - a. The system supports four American Academy of Pediatrics-recommended developmental screening tools:
 - i. Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ-3): General developmental screening
 - ii. Ages and Stages Questionnaire Social-Emotional (ASQ:SE-2): Social-emotional development screening
 - iii. Survey of Well-being of Young Children (SWYC): Well-researched but not formally validated tool
 - iv. Modified Checklist for Autism in Toddlers Revised (M-CHAT-R): Recommended at 18 months, available on provider dashboard only
 - b. Both the ASQ:SE-2 and the behavioral domain of the SWYC can be categorized as developmental screenings, but as mental/social-emotional health is an aspect of development, these tools are also considered child-level behavioral health/mental health screenings for this age group
- 5. Future Development:
 - a. Working on electronic health record interoperability with clinical partners
 - b. Exploring data sharing with Help Me Grow to eliminate duplicate entry
 - c. Piloting with early care and education providers

Washington Thriving Perinatal Updates

Sarah Rafton (Behavioral Health Catalyst), shared updates on the Washington Thriving Strategic Plan and an overview of the Perinatal Issue Brief

- 1. Washington Thriving is the state's prenatal-to-age-25 behavioral health strategic plan with a vision that every pregnant person, baby, child, youth, and young adult in Washington can thrive, supported by their parents and caregivers. The Strategic Plan's First Initiatives include:
 - a. System of Care Infrastructure
 - i. Leadership, governance, and coordination structures
 - ii. Shared goals to measure progress against
 - iii. Integrated funding
 - b. Services and Supports
 - i. Perinatal behavioral health
 - 1. The perinatal-focused First Initiative of Washington Thriving will aim to 1) strengthen screening and warm handoffs across care settings and 2) develop family-centered, integrated treatment capacity for those with substance use disorder.
 - ii. K-12 student behavioral health
 - iii. IDD/complex needs treatment capacity
- 2. Perinatal Issue Brief
 - a. From June to September, Washington Thriving convened an ad hoc group to discuss opportunities to strengthen perinatal supports for all (e.g. promotion and screening for



- perinatal mental health), for some (e.g. supports for those with an identified need), and for the important few (those with the most intensive needs e.g. family-centered support for those with perinatal substance use disorder, intensive support for those with severe mental illness, and support for co-occurring needs)
- b. Washington Thriving combined what they heard from this group with input received via other Washington Thriving workstreams into a draft issue brief. Stakeholders were asked to provide feedback on the draft brief via this form.
- c. The Washington Thriving team has received extensive feedback on the brief and will produce a substantially revised version for another round of review in October.

Statements of Support Subgroup Guidance and Timelines

Danae Villarreal (Behavioral Health Catalyst) shared a presentation on Statements of Support, a supplementary section of the CYBHWG Annual Report.

- 1. What are Statements of Support:
 - a. Endorsements from subgroups for initiatives that advance children's behavioral health goals
 - b. Can support agency work, state initiatives, or other efforts aligned with CYBHWG objectives
 - c. Opportunity to extend support beyond the 3 legislative recommendations per subgroup limit
 - d. Example: 2025 Statements of Support
- 2. Requirements:
 - a. Minimum one sentence with explanation
 - b. Additional detail as needed
 - c. No limit on number (unlike legislative recommendations)
- 3. Timeline:
 - a. October 6: Subgroup Legislative recommendations due
 - b. October 8: P5RH meeting to discuss statements of support
 - c. October 14: CYBHWG meeting to vote on recommendations
 - d. November 3: Statements of support due
