Proviso language Sec. 215 (108)

16-bed substance use disorder inpatient treatment facility in Grays Harbor County, specializing in treating pregnant and parenting individuals, using a family preservation model. The facility must allow families to reside together while a parent receives treatment.






The authority must contract for these services through behavioral health entities in a manner that allows leveraging of federal Medicaid funds to pay for a portion of the costs. The authority must consult with the department of children, youth, and families in the implementation of this funding.






Family Preservation Model



Structural components of a Family Preservation Model






Parent-Child Assistance Program (PCAP)

- 15 PCAP locations
- Serving 20 counties
- 1,490 client slots contracted
- Medicaid and State funded





MTP 2.0

The Medicaid Transformation Project (MTP) is Washington State's Section 1115 Medicaid demonstration waiver. MTP allows our state to create and continue to develop projects, activities, and services that improve Washington's health care system.

All MTP programs support Apple Health (Medicaid) enrollees.

In June 2023, the federal government approved MTP to continue for an additional five years. We call the MTP renewal "MTP 2.0," which will help widen our reach to provide more programs, services, and supports to our most vulnerable populations.





IMD stands for "institution for mental diseases." IMDs are hospitals, nursing facilities, or other institutions of more than 16 beds that are primarily engaged in providing diagnosis, treatment, or care of persons with mental diseases, which includes SUD.

We acknowledge the term "mental disease" may be harmful or stigmatizing. We use it in this context only to reflect the legal terminology used in statute.

Caregiver respite



Definition

- Intermittent temporary supervision provided on a short-term basis in the enrollee's home, a health care facility or an adult day center.
- Services provided to the enrollee are primarily non-medical and may include attending to the enrollee's basic self-help needs and other activities of daily living (ADL), ordinarily be performed by a caregiver.*



Qualifiers


Enrollees who live in the community and are compromised in their activities of daily living and/or have been assessed to have a behavioral health need and whose unpaid caregivers require relief to avoid enrollee being place in an institution.*



- Delivery system options
- Coverage criteria
- Allowable providers
- Credentialing
- Cost effectiveness



Washington State HRSN Services Approach



- Use a combination of In Lieu of Services (ILOS) and 1115 authorities to ensure availability of HRSN services across managed care and FFS
- Goal is to transition to available State Plan and ILOS authorities for long-term sustainability




Background

July 2020 – federal government passed legislation to add 988 as an option to contact the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (NSPL) hotline

July 16, 2022 - 988 calls answered in Washington

- 3 designated NSPL's in Washington
- All other hotlines & reginal call centers continue to operate as normal
- SAMHSA provides best practice crisis care toolkit - 2020
- SAMHSA & NASMHPD release a crisis care guide for youth - 2022

Washington's investment in youth best practices



Proviso funding went out to ensure 1 youth team in each of 10 regions

- Tripled the number of youth mobile response teams from 4-12
- Tripled the counties with youth teams from 5-15 counties.
- WA has 39 counties







Brings the Crisis Continuum to the family


Initial Response (up to 3 days of crisis intervention) all payors





Care pathway via 911 & the medical model



- How do families access services?
- Caregivers call 911 in a crisis
- ED remains primary access point – rarely results in downstream supports
- Can result in hospital boarding
- SSHB 1580 Children in crisis



MRSS is designed to create care pathways for youth

Youth crisis care pathway



Mobile Response and Stabilization Services (MRSS)

- Provides rapid in-person support for youth and families during a crisis
- ▶ Follow up for 1-3 days
- The stabilization phase is a medically necessary service that begins on day 4.
- Families have access to the MRSS team 24/7





Prenatal substance exposure

- House bill 1668, is related to providing prevention services, diagnosis, treatment and support for prenatal substance exposure.
 - Comprehensive prenatal substance treatment services
 - Recommendations report
 - Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) support groups
 - Interagency agreement



Comprehensive prenatal substance exposure treatment services



Included services

- Therapies
- Individual and family counseling
- Social skills support, links to community resources
- Family and education supports



Intended outcomes

- Maximize the number of families that can be served
- Keep families together
- Reduce the number of placements
- Prevent adverse outcomes for impacted children



Eligible clients

- Children who are over age 3 and have been prenatally exposed to substance
- Families who are, could potentially be involved in or at risk of being involved in the child welfare system



Recommendation report and support groups


Recommendation report

- Due June 1, 2024 and June 1, 2028
- Expansion of services
- Outcomes of services and recommendations

FASD support groups

 A statewide non-profit entity with expertise in FASD to provide free support groups for individuals living with FASD and their parents/caregivers





Interagency agreement

- Ensure coordination of identification, prevention and intervention programs for:
 - Children with prenatal substance exposure and
 - Women who are at high risk of having children with prenatal substance exposure
- Provide a process for community advocacy groups to participate in review and development of identification, prevention, and intervention programs administered or contracted for by the agencies.





Kids Mental Health WA*



Stand up community wide teams that convene to support the children, youth, and families in their regions.



Building an access portal for individuals concerned about a child or youth to reach out and request support.



Bring together a diverse team experts from regional teams to help the child and family access what they need. Identify partners with resources and create a stability plan while exploring available options.



Request for support for young people needing intensive services will be prioritized by the regional Kids Mental Health teams.




