SUBJECT: Opioid Settlement Tribal Set-Aside Implementation CONSULTATION CLOSE OUT

On August 8, 2023, the Health Care Authority (HCA), held a Tribal consultation on the Opioid Abatement Settlement Tribal Set-Aside Implementation Plan. A listening session and roundtable were held in July prior to consultation. HCA greatly appreciates all Tribal elected officials and Tribal health leaders that participated in any of these meetings, where we gathered very important feedback to inform the implementation plan and scope of work for this funding set aside allocation to Tribes and Urban Indian Health Programs (UIHP)s.

Background

Funding through the Opioid Settlement Abatement are a result of Washington State litigations to opioid pharmacy and manufacture settlements awarded at the end of 2022. These settlements will be used to combat the opioid epidemic. During the 2023 Legislative Session, opioid settlement dollars were appropriated for use in the upcoming 2023-2025 biennium. Opioid settlement funding provisos are contained in the final conference budget from the 2023 regular session and E2SSB 5536 during the special session. These appropriations were assigned across four agencies: the Health Care Authority, Department of Health, Labor and Industries, and the Department of Children, Youth, and Families (see settlement allocations attachment). State opioid settlement funds include the recommended distribution to Tribes of more than \$15 million dollars, as a result of the Consultation held on October 20, 2022, on the planning for the opioid abatement settlement plan recommendations. In addition to these state funds, opioid settlement funds are also being distributed directly to cities and counties across the state from multiple settlements. Tribes are encouraged to engage with the local governmental entities in their regions. Please note, the state has no influence over how these city and county funds are used or distributed.
