

## Clubhouse and Peer-run Organization program

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### Overview

Clubhouse and Peer-Run Organization programs benefit both individuals and peer communities working toward recovery. Clubhouses and Peer-Run Organizations demonstrate positive recovery and social outcomes. These programs benefit both the individuals receiving services and the communities they serve through core commitment and principles of evidence-based and/or promising best practices.

Clubhouse and Peer-Run Organizations support people living with behavioral health challenges. As individuals reengage in friendship, family, employment, and education, they may need continued support and resources during their recovery. Clubhouse and Peer-Run Organizations provide recovery community environments for people whose lives have been impacted due to behavioral health challenges, and who need the support of others to reach their own vision of recovery.

Clubhouses and Peer-Run Organizations strive to help members participate in mainstream employment and educational opportunities, find community-based housing, join health and wellness activities, to reduce hospitalizations, reduce involvement with the criminal court system, and to improve social relationships, satisfaction, and quality of life.

Clubhouse and Peer-run Organization programs benefit individuals seeking multiple pathways to recovery with behavioral health. The program consists of four approaches in providing non-clinical recovery and peer supports including:

- Alternative Promising Practices (HCA adheres to tribal communities definition of best practices in serving their communities).

### Program outcomes SY24

As of July 2024, the Clubhouses and Peer-run Program consist of 42 providers/ locations (12 Clubhouses, 14 Recovery Community Organizations, 14 Recovery Cafes and 1 Tribal - Alternative Promising Practice). Below are service outcomes for 2023-2024:

- Number of enrollments: 9,584
- Basic needs assistance: 13,629
- Employment services: 3,243
- Educational services: 8,250
- Average daily attendance: 4,635
