(Housing Options for Students in Transition)  Kim Rinehardt	Kim Rinehardt, Executive Director of the Mason County HOST Program shared her background and her passion for the program.  The Mason County HOST program is a community-based housing match program that offers support to youth in pursuing education goals while creating supportive transitional housing opportunities. The program started eight years ago and currently has 40 youth matched with homes. The program can provide food, clothing, hygiene products, and case management. Youth in the program have a 98% graduation rate and 86% go to college. Structure Activity  Kris Royal on behalf of Nicole Miller	Participants in the meeting were given 5 minutes to write down any questions they had regarding the Children's Behavioral Health Governance Structure, which includes FYSPRTs. A panel including Kris Royal, Michelle Karnath, Patty King, and Evelyn Maddox answered the questions.  Some of the questions addressed in the meeting included:  1. Is there any overall evaluation of the WISe model effectiveness? – Information about the Youth and Family Survey and WISe Quarterly Reports was shared.  2. When is the new FYSPRT Manual coming out? – The goal is the end of June 2018.  3. What is the difference between Children's Behavioral Health and DBHR? – The Children's Behavioral Health Unit is part of the Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery (DBHR).  4. Is FYSPRT going to follow DBHR to HCA (Health Care Authority)? And will it look the same as currently? – Yes, Regional FYSPRT contracts will still be overseen by DBHR after integrating with HCA on July1, 2018. Deliverables will continue to look the same for Regional FYSPRTs, however, will be contracted between HCA and Behavioral Health Organizations (BHOs) or the Administrative Service Organizations (ASOs).  5. Will funding change in July for FYSPRT? – No, the funding amount per quarter will be the same.  Additional questions were submitted as part of the activity. The additional questions will be shared with Statewide FYSPRT Tri-Leads to develop a plan to address the remaining questions.  Table documents to help address some questions included the Challenge and Solution Submission Form Tracking Log, utilized by the Statewide FYSPRT Tri-leads to track challenges, solutions and where they are in the process. Information was shared about the Accountable Communities of Health (ACH) across the state. Accountable Communities of Health bring together leaders from multiple health sectors with a common interest in improving health and health equity, to better align resources and activities to support wellness, and a system that delivers care for the whole person.
