Background on the Relationship Between SUD and Housing-Related Supports



Intersection of SUD, Homelessness, and Housing Stability

- Nearly 12% of Medicaid beneficiaries over 18 years of age have a SUD
- Nearly 50% of those with SUD have a co-occurring mental health disorder
- Research has established a strong association between homelessness and SUD
- Studies indicate associations between stable housing and positive health outcomes for individuals with SUD

Populations at Risk for Both SUD and Housing Instability

- Individuals in transition:
 - Youth aging out of foster care
 - Individuals released from prisons and jails
- Individuals experiencing homelessness, including subgroups with unique needs:
 - Adolescents and youth
 - Pregnant women
 - Chronically homeless adults
 - Older adults



An inadequate supply of a continuum of housing options

- Supplies of affordable housing and rent subsidies are inadequate to meet the need
- Range of housing models that meet individuals where they are in their recovery process are not adequate (Housing First Permanent Supportive Housing and Recovery Housing options)

- Multiple barriers that may complicate or exclude access to housing
 - Criminal record
 - Poor credit history
 - Outstanding rent or utility arrears
 - Securing identification and other required documentation
 - Access to security deposits and first/last month rents

- Individuals with co-occurring mental health and SUD are among the most vulnerable and hardest-to-house
 - Outreach and engagement are often required and relationships may need to be built gradually over time to assist individuals into housing
 - Housing paired with individualized and ongoing supports are required to help stabilize participants in and sustain their housing once placed.
 - Landlord outreach, engagement, and ongoing communications are often required to prevent evictions.
 - Intensive care coordination with behavioral health and health care providers can improve agreement to remain engaged and continuity of care.

- Individuals with SUD who are experiencing or are at risk of homelessness face unique barriers to enrolling in Medicaid programs
 - One-on-one assistance is often required to help navigate the enrollment process
 - Ongoing supports are required to maintain enrollment in some places

Medicaid Opportunities to Address Housing-Related Supports

- Federal Financial Participation (FFP) is not available to state Medicaid programs for room and board (except in certain Medicaid medical institutions).
- FFP is available under certain federal authorities for housing-related activities and supports that promote health and community integration for Medicaid-eligible individuals with SUD.
- More recently, many individuals who are experiencing homelessness have become eligible for Medicaid as a result of Medicaid expansion, increasing the need for state Medicaid programs to cover supports for individuals with a mental disorder and/or SUD, including housing-related and recovery supports.

Housing-Related Activities and Supports

Housing-related supports intended to help an individual achieve and maintain housing stability include the following:

- Individual Housing Transition Activities activities that support an individual's ability to prepare for and transition to housing;
- Individual Housing and Tenancy Sustaining Activities activities that support the individual in being a successful tenant
 in his/her housing arrangement and thus able to sustain tenancy;

State-Level Housing Related Collaborative Activities

- Defining priority population/s to target with housingrelated supports based on medical need and other risk factors.
- Determine care coordination strategies to ensure multidisciplinary medical, behavioral health and social support needs are assessed and linkages are made.
- Examine cross system data strategies that will be used to examine service utilization and outcomes.
- Bring together in partnerships the State Health Authority, State Behavioral Health Agencies and/or State or local housing agencies.

State Technical Assistance (TA) Needs Assessment

- Section 1018 of the SUPPORT Act authorized HHS to provide TA to states related to housing supports under Medicaid for people with SUD
- To inform this work, CMS is conducting a state-by-state Needs Assessment to collect information about:
 - Current and planned activities in this area
 - Barriers to states working in this area
 - Technical assistance needs
- States were contacted on July 15th to begin completing the survey and responses are currently being collected.

State Learning Collaborative

- The State Medicaid Housing-Related Supports for SUD Learning Collaborative will be available for up to 10 states and will convene from November 2020 through July 2021.
- CMS will provide selected states with the opportunity to learn from peer states through facilitated sharing of information, resources, best practices, and lessons learned from states' experiences.
- Participating state Medicaid agencies will develop and expand their capacity to implement and strengthen strategies for providing housing-related supports and care coordination under Medicaid to individuals with SUD.

State Learning Collaborative

The Learning Collaborative will include:

- An onboarding webinar;
- A virtual kick-off meeting;
- An in-person mid-way point meeting in the Washington, DC area with CMS and subject matter experts (depending on conditions at the time);
- Three to four peer-to-peer topical webinars;
- One-on-one state check-ins; and
- A final close out webinar on lessons learned and next steps.

State Learning Collaborative

- State Medicaid agency participants are strongly encouraged to invite partners from state-level housing and behavioral health agencies to join them in this learning opportunity, thereby sharing state learning and potentially strengthening these critical partnerships.
