



Building equity into our health system

Examples:

- Offering culturally specific, multi-lingual services for non-majority patient populations
- Recognizing the influences of <u>Adverse Childhood</u> Experiences and generational trauma on health and behavior
- Employing a diverse and inclusive workforce that mirrors the populations we serve.



Building equity into Washington State's health system

What is health equity?

Health equity: Health equity exists when all people have the opportunity to attain their full health potential and no one is disadvantaged.

Health disparities: "Differences in incidence, prevalence, mortality, or burden of disease and other adverse health conditions that exist between specific population groups."



What is health equity?


Social determinants of health: "Those elements of social structure most closely shown to affect health and illness, including at a minimum, early learning, education, socioeconomic standing, safe housing, gender, incidence of violence, convenient and affordable access to safe opportunities for physical activity, healthy diet, and appropriate health care services"*

Linking the social determinants of health with health disparities




Why is equity important?

- Equal opportunity
- Currently 30% of Washington's population identify as people of color
- Eliminating health disparities for minorities would reduce medical care expenditures by \$230 billion*
- From 2003-2006 almost 1/3 of direct medical costs were associated with health disparities.*



Healthier Washington's commitment to equity:

The state's goal is to eliminate health inequities due to social factors:

- Disability
- Education, type of job held
- · Gender identity, sexual orientation
- Homelessness or the neighborhood lived in
- Immigration status
- Language spoken
- · Race, ethnicity, age, gender, religion
- Socioeconomic status, source of income
- Tribal membership



- Language in the Special Terms and Conditions: Improve Health Equity and Reduce Health Disparities. Implement prevention and health promotion strategies for targeted populations to address health disparities and achieve health equity.
- ACHs are accountable for metrics related to social determinants of health, depending on selected projects
 - Percent arrested
 - Percent homeless



The Health Innovation Leadership Network Communities & Equity Committee has three subcommittees:

- Data Disaggregation
- ACH Equity Support
- Workforce Development



BHT vision

In our region every person, regardless of environment, background, or life experiences, will live a productive, high quality life by ensuring access to:













An **integrated whole person** health care system.

Stable **housing**, nutritious **food**, and **transportation**.

Opportunity for education and training that allows for meaningful employment that pays the bills with some left over for savings.

Social support networks that allow for emotional, social and psychological wellbeing.



Disparities in the BHT region

- 75% white, with increasing racial diversity trends across the region
- Aging population with declining workforce
- On average, 1/3 of each BHT county's population is on Medicaid
- Regional housing and transportation shortfalls
- Urban and Rural disparities in resources and access
- Downstream effects of family trauma and ACEs




Unaffordable housing and transportation, combined

Shading is based on statewide *rank* for percent of income spent on housing & transportation for a 4-person household at median income. A darker shade means the area ranks higher on that particular measure. Absolute values not shown.

- Equity through Community Voice
- Equity as a Best Practice

Equity through community voices

- Community Voices Council: To be comprised of 51% Medicaid beneficiaries, charged with:
 - Reviewing transformation plans from the perspective of those accessing services
 - Recommending activities that accelerate health equity
 - Advising on general communication for systems changes
- Tribal Partners Leadership Council: Honoring the special relationships with tribal partners, this groups reviews and advises Transformation efforts to assess impact on Native Americans and look for opportunities for alignment.

Equity as a best practice

- Partners to speak to how they apply an "Equity Lens"
- Examples of activities from Oregon's transformation work:
 - Culturally and linguistically appropriate care
 - Diversity of work force
 - Use of CHWs
 - Better collection and use of data
- Recommendations from BHTs Leadership Council
 - Host Equity conference with opportunities for trainings and workshops
 - Align Leadership Council around policy advocacy
 - Require partners to speak to Health Equity in their Transformation Plans

Equity in waiver financing

Equity accelerator

- This is a one time payment to demonstrate the ACHs commitment to closing the gap on health inequities.
- This payment recognizes providers who serve more than the region's % of ethnic diversity.

Rural accelerator

- This is a one time payment to demonstrate the ACHs commitment to closing the gap on health inequities.
- This payment recognizes the challenge of poverty and resource scarcity in rural counties.

Future funding

- Community Voices Council working on recommendations for Health Equity Accelerator activities to embed in Transformation
- Waiver Finance team will assess and recommend funding allocation for activities
- Upon Board Approval, BHT would reward partners who take on Health Equity advancement activities with payments


