

About Medicaid

- Medicaid is a federal health care program administered by each state.
- The Health Care Authority (HCA) manages Washington State's Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) programs under "Apple Health."
- Medicaid in Washington State is Apple Health.
- The federal government helps pay for the program and creates rules for how the program works.



About Medicaid, continued

- A state must apply for a Section 1115 Medicaid demonstration waiver when it wants to make changes from normal Medicaid guidelines.
 - ► Washington received this waiver in 2017, called MTP.
 - Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) is our federal partner and the entity that approves MTP and its changes.



About MTP

- MTP allows our state to create and continue to develop projects, activities, and services that improve Washington's health care system.
- All work under MTP benefits those enrolled in Apple Health.
- Our current MTP waiver ends June 30, 2023.
 - ► Last year, HCA and DSHS applied to CMS to renew MTP for an additional five years.
 - ▶ We call the renewal "MTP 2.0."



About the MTP amendment request

- Health Care Authority (HCA) and the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) are requesting an amendment to the current MTP waiver.
- ▶ If approved, this amendment would authorize:
 - 1. Medicaid coverage for former foster care youth (FFCC)—also known as Alumni coverage in Washington—from other states who turn (or turned) 18 prior to January 1, 2023.
 - 2. Continuous enrollment for CHIP coverage for CHIP children during the first six years of their lives.



About FFCC

- If approved, this would authorize Medicaid coverage for FFCC from other states who turn (or turned) 18 prior to January 1, 2023.
 - ► Coverage will remain until enrollees reach age 26.
- This flexibility will provide coverage for FFCC who are not covered under the Support Act's mandatory coverage policy for those who turn 18 on or after January 1, 2023.
 - ▶ This coverage would apply through December 31, 2030.
- ▶ We estimate 180 FFCC enrollees will be eligible for coverage during the MTP 2.0 period.



About FFCC, continued

- Allowing access to health services for FFCC ensures continued coverage as enrollees transition into adulthood.
- Note: we are also submitting a State Plan Amendment (SPA) to cover foster youth from other states who turn 18 after January 1, 2023.
 - ► Per Section 1002 of the Support Act
 - ▶ Between both authorities (the amendment and SPA), our state can cover all foster care youth from out of state, regardless of when they turn 18



About continuous enrollment

- If approved, this amendment would allow CHIP children to be continuously enrolled until the end of the month in which their sixth birthday falls.
 - ► Amendment for children, ages zero to six, who are enrolled in CHIP with incomes up to 317 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL).
- ▶ We estimate 16,707 enrollees will be continuously enrolled from 2024-2028.



How this amendment can help Washington's children & youth

- If approved, this amendment will help our state continue providing coverage and ensuring access to health care for children and individuals who are at risk of losing their health care coverage.
- Access to health care is especially important for children and individuals experiencing health and behavioral issues.
- Children and youth are some of our state's most vulnerable people. We need to look out for and protect them.



Some statistics

- In December 2022, there were a total of 2,286,441 Apple Healtheligible people in Washington State. Of these, 99,921 were American Indian/Alaska Native.
- Gaps in coverage are higher for **children of color**, ages zero to six.
 - ► For children within this group, Washington data show **4.6 to 6.3 months** of disruption in coverage over 600 months of possible coverage.
- But we can change this!
