

MTP overview

- MTP is Washington's Section 1115 Medicaid demonstration waiver between HCA and Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS).
- MTP allows the state to create and continue to develop projects, activities, and services that benefit Apple Health (Medicaid) enrollees.



MTP initiatives

- 1. Transformation through Accountable Communities of Health (ACHs) and Indian Health Care Providers (IHCPs): ACHs and IHCPs are implementing projects that change the way people receive health care in their region.
- 2. Long-Term Services and Supports (LTSS): support Washington's aging population and family caregivers through Medicaid Alternative Care (MAC) and Tailored Supports for Older Adults (TSOA) programs.
- 3. Foundational Community Supports (FCS): helps vulnerable adults find and maintain stable housing and employment.



MTP initiatives, continued

- 4. Substance use disorder (SUD) IMD: allows Washington State to make improvements and use federal financial participation for Medicaid SUD treatment services in facilities that are "institutions for mental diseases" (IMDs).
- 5. Mental health IMD: allows Washington State to purchase acute inpatient services for Medicaid clients between the ages of 21 and 65 who reside in a dedicated large psychiatric facility that qualifies as an IMD.



Initiative 1: successes and challenges

Successes:

- Over \$545 million distributed to-date to support delivery system reform
- Over 780 partner organizations received funding, with many others engaged and collaborating
- Expanded focus on health equity
- Cohesive effort to advance community-based care coordination

Challenges:

- Workforce shortages across the health care system
- Continued impacts and recovery activities due to COVID-19
- Navigating ambiguity with transition to MTP 2.0



MAC and TSOA accomplishments

- As of mid November 2022, almost 14,000 care receivers have been served since September 2017.
- Client Satisfaction survey showed 83 percent were pleased with services.
- **Delayed/diverted** care receivers from needing more intensive and costly LTSS programs, which saved both federal and state dollars.
- 2022 quarterly reports to CMS demonstrate that ALTSA and Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) have exceeded proficiency requirements in all quality measures.
- Worked with partners **to improve the translated Spanish version** of the TCARE caregiver assessment.

Supportive Housing accomplishments

- Currently serving 1,276 ALTSA clients, as of August 2022.
 - o76 percent of ALTSA clients with identified serious mental illness (SMI)

o66 percent of non-ALTSA clients in Supportive Housing with SMI

• July through September 2022, ALTSA provided:

o82 provider technical assistance sessions

o15 regional or statewide trainings for ALTSA FCS services and supports

Supported Employment accomplishments

• Currently serving 900 ALTSA clients, as of August 2022.

 \circ 81 percent of ALTSA clients with identified SMI

- ALTSA clients utilize services at a higher rate than non-ALTSA clients (up to 11 percent higher per month, with an average of 7.6 percent higher since September 2021)
- Preliminary findings based on client analysis completed in September 2018:

o+8 percent employment increase for ALTSA clients

Average earnings increased by more than \$200 per quarter for ALTSA clients

 ALTSA Employment team provides FCS supported employment and benefits planning trainings to over 750 individual ALTSA and AAA staff each year.

Challenges in 2022

Supported Employment

- Provider shortage in some areas
- Travel costs for providers to serve clients in rural/hard-toserve areas
- Coordination with subject matter experts for decision making

MAC and TSOA programs

- In-home respite & personal care provider shortage
- Social isolation for clients & caregivers
- COVID-19 hampered outreach efforts
- Implementing use of individual providers through Consumer Direct of Washington was delayed

Supportive Housing

- Provider network capacity
- Lack of rental subsidies to pair with services
- Coordination with subject matter experts for decision making

Initiative 3: successes and challenges

Successes

- More than 28,000 individuals enrolled since 2018
- 175 providers with 450+ locations statewide
- Increased collaboration and new funding:
 - Transition Assistance Program (FCS TAP)
 - Supported Employment and Housing & Essential Needs expansion
 - Apple Health and Homes

Challenges

- Medicaid billing for "non-traditional" providers
- Culture shift to billing Medicaid for Supportive Housing services
- Increase collaboration with inpatient treatment facilities



Initiatives 4 & 5: successes

- These initiatives allow Medicaid dollars to be used in institutions for mental diseases (IMDs).
 - Saved the state nearly 10 million dollars in stateonly funds
 - Promoted increased access to care in both inpatient and outpatient settings
 - Underscores our commitment to increased quality in IMDs and greater access to care in community settings



Initiatives 4 & 5: challenges

- COVID-19 added stressors to individuals and providers alike:
 - Increased challenges for the provision of inpatient services
 - Added additional variables to required evaluations
 - The pandemic likely worsened provider workforce shortages:
 - May have hastened retirements
 - May have prompted a percentage of clinicians to switch to roles where they could work remotely via telemedicine



MTP renewal: MTP 2.0

- In summer 2022, Washington State applied for an MTP renewal, called MTP 2.0.
- Under MTP 2.0, we're asking to continue our current MTP programs, along with expanding the following programs.



MTP 2.0: proposed program expansions

Long-Term Services and Supports (LTSS):

- Expand to include:
 - Rental subsidies
 - Coordinated personal care
 - Guardianship and decision-making supports
 - Presumptive eligibility
- This will provide more support and services for aged, blind, and disabled adults who are applying for and receiving home and community-based services.



MTP 2.0: proposed program expansions cont'd

Foundational Community Supports (FCS):

- Expand the age requirement to "16 and older" so transition age youth and youth exiting foster care can receive supportive housing services.
- Expand the eligibility criteria for those eligible for supported employment services, including individuals exiting a correctional facility or having an "on parole" status.

Substance use disorder (SUD) IMD:

Expand to provide contingency management for qualifying adults.



MTP 2.0: new proposed programs

- Taking Action for Healthier Communities (TAHC), which builds on the work currently named "Initiative 1: transformation through ACHs and IHCPs."
 - Develop and implement community hubs in each ACH region
 - Establish broad delivery of health-related services
 - Emphasize health equity
 - Expand community-based workforce
- Provide technological support to hubs by implementing a community information exchange.
- Work with Tribes and Indian health care providers on similar services to be delivered in a culturally attuned fashion.
 Washington State Health Care Authority

MTP 2.0: new proposed programs

Continuous Apple Health enrollment for children

Children in Apple Health do not have breaks in coverage because of changes in income through their sixth birthday.

Re-entry coverage for continuity of care

Individuals exiting a correctional or treatment facility have health care coverage immediately upon reentering the community.

Apple Health postpartum coverage extension

Individuals have health care coverage for twelve months (one year) after their pregnancy ends.



MTP 2.0: new proposed programs cont'd

Washington Integrated Care Assessment (WA-ICA)

- Helps assess a provider or clinic's level of integration for physical and behavioral health care.
- Provides technical assistance and targeted incentives for providers/practices to begin or continue their efforts in advancing clinical integration.



MTP 2.0 update

- HCA and the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) began meeting with CMS in October.
 - CMS won't finish their MTP 2.0 negotiations by the end of this year.
 - CMS approved a short extension—*from January 1–June* 30, 2023—to the *current* MTP waiver period, which was slated to end December 31, 2022.
- This short extension will allow:
 - Current MTP programs to continue, and Apple Health enrollees can continue to have access to services without disruption of care.
 - Time for CMS to review Washington's MTP 2.0 application.
 - Our state to continue to negotiate and work with CMS.



MTP 2.0 update cont'd

- CMS' short extension *may* include approval of *some* MTP 2.0 policies by June 30, 2023, based on precedent in other states.
- Some MTP 2.0 policies—*if* approved by CMS would be approved by mid-2023 because they require ongoing negotiation with CMS.
- The new policies and programs of MTP 2.0 will be phased in throughout the life of the renewal.
