Agency collaboration

Health Care Authority (HCA), Department of Health (DOH), and Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) are working with the Governor's Office to submit the application.

Intentional public engagement

We worked across platforms and networks to meaningfully engage the public. We also welcomed stakeholders' ideas.

Key priorities

Based on conversations with and written feedback from the public, we identified key priorities for funding that work best for Washington.

What is the Rural Health Transformation Program?

The recent federal budget (H.R.1) created the Rural Health Transformation Program (RHTP) to support sustainable health care change for rural communities.

Funding for RHTP will provide \$10 billion in federal funds each year from 2026–2030. Applying states will be approved or denied no later than December 31, 2025. Once approved, states are eligible for all five years of funding from RHTP.

Our initial priorities were based on the RHTP funding criteria and early stakeholder input:

- Sustainable delivery system reforms
- Workforce programs to grow, attract, and retain teams
- Programs to improve prevention, chronic disease management, and aging in place
- Investments in infrastructure, particularly technology
- Plans that align with state investments and build new programs over time

Request for public feedback

DOH, DSHS, and HCA worked closely with Governor Ferguson's Office throughout this process. We knew the most complete application would use feedback from the public.

In August 2025, we posted a **request for information** to HCA's website using the H.R.1 criteria for the RHTP fund. We also linked to this webpage from agency social media and a **GovDelivery notice**. The due date for submissions is September 26.

Thirty other states also requested input from the public. For example:

- Colorado provided a one-pager explaining RHTP.
- New Mexico is soliciting for a consultant to help with their application.
- Mississippi provided a one-pager and is also seeking consultant support.

Sixteen states have not put forth any action.

DOH, DSHS, and HCA also engaged in talks with associations, stakeholder groups, community collaboratives, and other agencies such as the Department of Commerce.

Key priorities for RHTP funding

The public's feedback clarified needs and added context based on lived experiences. With the public's help, we chose the priorities in the following table.

We'll set aside administrative funds for reporting and evaluation, grants management, and oversight costs. Tribes will also have funds set aside.

We'll try to incorporate any vital feedback from the webinar into the application.

DOH, DSHS, HCA, and Governor Ferguson's Office will continue to work together on the RHTP application.

The RHTP application is due **November 5, 2025**. Governor Ferguson's Office appointed HCA to submit the application for Washington. We'll keep you updated in this process.

By the end of the year, we'll send a notification if Washington's application was approved or denied.

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
